CITIZENS FORMAL COMPLAINTS ON OFFICERS: (2)

1. A citizen filed a complaint against a Flandreau Police Department officer for civil right violation. The case is under investigation by the US Department of Justice.
2. A citizen filed a complaint with the Public Safety Commission on how he was investigated when county employees reported the person as a security threat during a court trial. It was considered unfounded and no action was taken.
3. Citizens made inquiries towards department employees that did not constitute a formal complaint.

The Flandreau Police Department internally had five disciplinary actions against department employees for violating standard operating procedures. In our community response to over 1,200 calls for service, two formal complaints are exemplary of the promising practices through community policing initiatives. I am very proud of all department employees' quality performance in providing professional services to our community.

We are excited and look forward to meeting new challenges into the New Year. I believe the Flandreau Police Department has developed a close relationship and partnership with the citizens in making the community safer. In the past two years, we have seen a tremendous response from the community reporting criminal activity or providing information related to potential crime.

We are committed on keeping the community informed on police/community issues and one success has been through our cooperation with the local Moody County Enterprise. With the police blotter and press releases on high profile cases, the public is kept informed. The communication process with the public has been an invaluable tool. I am confident that implementing community networks maintains public trust, builds partnerships, and improves over-all quality of life.

We are excited on some new anticipated projects and programs that are in transition. We have started a Dare Program with the Flandreau Elementary School. We have been researching and discussing the prospect of having a drug canine established into the operations of the Flandreau Police Department. The opportunity would enable an officer to become trained as a canine handler. The canine unit would help our community and countywide goals in reducing drug trafficking in the Flandreau area.

We are presently in the process of making the Flandreau Police Department more accessible to the public. The operation plans are to begin using the front of the Police Department on East 2nd Avenue. There will be a public lobby for police matters, a front desk office receptionist to assist the public, and a private interview room on criminal investigations.
